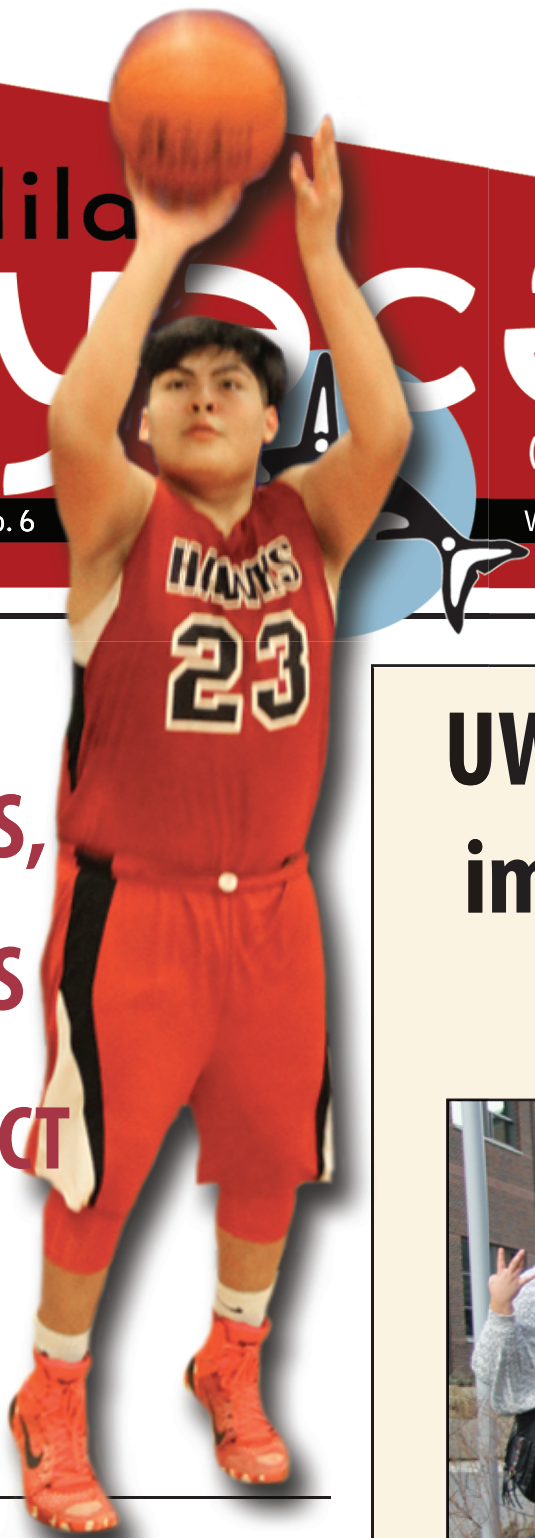

The University of Washington Bothell campus held its 4th annual Reaching American Indian Nations (RAIN) diversity recruitment event Friday, February 5. RAIN is a day dedicated to preparing

students of American Indian, Alaskan Native and Native American backgrounds with the tools necessary to access higher education.

Native high school and middle school students and faculty from Native American

educational programs from all across Washington State were invited to attend RAIN 2016. Native Liaison and school advocates, Matt Remle and Ricky Belmont, took full advantage of the RAIN invite. They, along with Santana

The request must contain the person's name, roll #, voter's home address where the absentee ballot will be mailed to, and the signature of the voter. A request to mail a ballot to an address that is not the home address of the voter must include a statement, signed by the voter, explaining why a different address is requested. Absentee ballots will not be handed out after March 17, 2016 due to postmark requirements by the post office and mailing time. **Absentee ballots must be received no later than 4:00 p.m. on Friday, March 18, 2016 at the UPS Store, Quil Ceda Plaza, 8825 34th NE Suite L-#161 Tulalip, WA 98271.** Only one absentee ballot per individual voter will be issued. Absentee ballots can be requested from the Election Staff at the Tribal Administration building, 2nd floor. If you have any questions, call the Election staff at (360) 716-4283, fax (360) 716-0635 or call for email address. Absentee request can be faxed or scanned/emailed in.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Upon requesting an Absentee Ballot Packet, a voter is unable to vote in person on Election Day for this election. Absentee ballots **cannot** be delivered to the polling place on Election Day. The voter **must** mail the completed ballot as directed to the Elections post office box. Also Absentee Ballot Packets contain TWO envelopes. **VOTERS SIGNATURE IS REQUIRED ON THE OUTSIDE ENVELOPE TO BE VALID.**

Minors Trust Accounts Investment Option Changes

Once a year in February the parents or guardians for Tulalip Minors can change the investment options for your child. There are two Choose Pool A Conservative, this is the default option, is more like a savings account with a little extra boost to keep up with inflation. Then Pool B is Balances, has a little more risk but is aged based so the money is invested more at a younger age and then gets less aggressive as it gets closer to distribution. Over the last 11 years for example Where half money has been invested is what has been deposited by the tribe. \$50,511.00 – If you have that money in the Pool A they have earned \$379.97 with the same amount invested in Pool B they have earned \$6203.16.

Hypothetical example from age 0-18 if per capita and bonus stays the same. They could earn \$39,942 more in pool B. This is not a guarantee, depends on economy.

Amounts

There are also options now to put 50%, 75% or 100% in trust. The 75% was added last year and can help some parents with tax break because the money that is deposited is not taxed at the time it is deposited.

Also finance has added an option that can assist with taxes for yourself or minor children. Right not the minimum they withhold is 10% for taxes but it can be changed to 15% or 20%.

Tribal ID

Each Member can receive 1 free ID per Calendar year, after that they cost \$5. They do not have change at cashier window so please bring the cor-

rect amount, but they accept debt cards. GAS DISCOUNT -you need to use the most current ID, We void out the ones lost, stolen or replaced ID's.

All changes must be done by the 18th of each month for per capita. ALL CHANGES MUST BE DONE IN WRITING.

Letter: A letter may be written with the member's name, enrollment #, DOB and new address. It does need to be signed and dated by the member, parent/guardian.

E-mail: If you're going to be using an e-mail we need the following information: Last 4 digits of your SS # and DOB. An e-mail can be sent to:

Minor parents must provide the child's DOB and the tribal parents last 4 of their SS #. If the parent/guardian is not an enrolled member, we ask that they provide the DOB for each child and previous address.

Adult members must provide the last 4 digits of their SS # and DOB. If there are still questions regarding the e-mailed change, enrollment may ask you to verify the previous mailing address on file.

We've put these requirements in place for the member's protection.

Finance:

- 1099-MISC Tax Form – Reprint Request
- The Membership Distribution will be accepting year-end 1099 MISC tax form request starting February 11, 2016. The tax form request is available at the Finance cashier window or CSR for the Tribal member to fill out. The 1099-MISC will be reissued on Thursday and will be available for pick-up by 4:00PM at the Finance Cashier Window (1st Floor Administration Building).
- If you do not have a current address or it's incorrect on file, please make sure to change your address with the Enrollment Department.

Enrollment – Start Saving Documents Now to Protect the Future Enrollment of your Children and so on

Enrollment Residency – The burden of proof is on the applicant so

make sure to start saving any documents you have now. Any type of residency documents can be added now to yours or your children's file, just make sure it includes the name, address (on Tulalip Reservation) and a date.

The applicant is required to have some type of documentation in order to prove residency. You can't enroll with only residency affidavits anymore. The residency affidavits are only a last resort option if you use them but, you will still have to also have at least one document to go along with the affidavits.

Examples:

- Utilities Bills
- Tulalip Authority Housing
- School Records – E.I. Transcripts
- Mail from School also works.
- Tulalip Housing Records
- Lease Agreements
- Court Papers
- Medical Records
- Bank Statements
- Credit Cards Bills
- Mail Envelopes with stamped dated

Remember you have to prove at least one year of residency for the applicant's parents. So you need

to have something current, maybe something in the middle and then something a year prior to first document, and they all need to be before applicant was born. The more documentation the better.

PLEASE START TURNING IN DOCUMENTS NOW IN ORDER TO ENSURE THE ENROLLMENT OF YOUR FUTURE GENERATIONS!!!

Minimum Documents for Enrollment

- Original Certified Birth Certificate
- Completed Application
- DNA – if the father is only tribal member or if using the fathers residency proof. Enrollment does the testing and we try to schedule on Tuesday. 360716-4300
- SS – Copy of card or Verification of SS number
- Residency – One year proof for Tulalip parent before birth of applicant
- Dual Check – If one parent is enrolled in another Federally Recognized Tribe we need verification the applicant is not enrolled there.

Shopbell, chaperoned several Tulalip high school students so they could attend and get a taste of the university experience.

“We have created this culturally relevant event where we can bring amazing people out to speak on all the reasons you, as a Native American high school student, should go to college, and to explain why higher education is important as a Native American person. How can you use it to connect to your community or be more a part of your community or work for your community,” explains Rachael Meares, Native American Outreach Coordinator for UW Bothell. “We just hope that they get that idea here. It doesn't matter if they want to attend this campus or another college. We just want them to start thinking about and planning for college.”

The inspiration that led to

UW Bothell creating RAIN four years ago happened right here on the Tulalip Reservation. It was during a routine admission workshop that Rachael Meares was undertaking at Tulalip Heritage High School that inspiration struck. The junior and senior high school students at Tulalip Heritage were so eager to participate in her workshop and to learn of the opportunities available at UW Bothell that Meares thought it would be really beneficial for the students to spend a day at the UW Bothell campus. While on campus, students participated in various workshops, while exploring and learning about what university life at UW Bothell has to offer them. The Tulalip students received an alternative college perspective that wouldn't otherwise be available to them here on the reservation.

A few months later, the entire Tulalip Heritage High School

student body, with chaperoning from teachers, spent a day at the UW Bothell campus learning about the university and opportunities available only a short thirty minute drive south on I-5. That day marked the first culturally relevant outreach event for Native American students, which was given the name Reaching American Indian Nations, or more commonly referred to as RAIN. The next year Meares and her colleagues from the UW Bothell Division of Enrollment Management extended invites to Tulalip Heritage and other tribal schools across Washington. The event has continued to grow with an increasing number of tribal students attending and more workshops being offered.

“Before RAIN our Native American student admission numbers were extremely low. Four years ago we had only four Native

students attending UW Bothell, but now we currently have ninety-one Native students enrolled. Our Native American student population has grown a lot over the last few years and we want to continue building upon the momentum RAIN has given us,” states Meares, who also carries the title of Admissions Advisor and Recruiter for UW Bothell.

At this year's RAIN, the students were welcomed with breakfast, introductions of the coordinating event staff, and an opening prayer by Marysville Pilchuck High School Native Liaison, Matt Remle (Lakota). The students then heard a culturally oriented keynote speech from university professor and former chancellor Dr. Warren Buck (Choctaw).

Following their warm welcoming, the middle and high school students chose two out of

eight available on-site workshops to attend. Keeping the idea of cultural relevancy in play, each workshop was specifically tailored to the Native American students pursuing higher education. Each workshop were also led by a Native American staff member of UW Bothell.

For the Tulalip students, they received a glimpse at university life that pushes the boundaries for what opportunities are available to them after graduating high school.

They were able to learn about higher education opportunities and campus programs, while participating in cultural and educational workshops. The college admissions process, touring UW Bothell, meeting future classmates, and networking with community partners were designed to give students a better understanding of college life, while relating the importance of education to the individual and their communities.

Following the event, students participated in an anonymous questionnaire, these are some of the answers:

Q. How did this event inspire/motivate you?

- "Feel less stressed about college and more prepared for college."
- "That I can learn a lot about me and my culture if I apply myself."
- "It showed me how cool campus life is."
- "It opened me up and makes me want to explore even more community colleges, universities and Tribal colleges."
- "Inspired me to think about going to Northwest Indian College."
- "This event inspired me to seek a sense of community, be it in college or not."

Attention Fishermen

Over the years we at Tulalip Fisheries have confiscated numerous nets, crab and shrimp pots for a variety of Violations. At this time we are petitioning the Tribal Court to have the gear forfeited per Tulalip Tribes Code 8.05.

Persons wishing to claim any gear will have 15 days from the last day this add runs (March 2, 2016) to put in a claim for gear.

ANYONE PUTTING IN A CLAIM FOR GEAR WILL BE REQUIRED TO PROVIDE THE FOLLOWING

- Police Report of when gear was left or lost, area gear was left or lost, and what gear was fishing for.
- Person claiming gear will have to name person fishing gear at time. This will be checked

against fishing permits. Upon any violations a citation will be issued.

- Proof of Ownership, including bill of sale, invoice, etc.
- Will be required to appear for any Court Hearing (s) for the gear you are claiming.
- May receive a Citation in all cases that gear was in violation of Tulalip Tribal Code 8.05 fines will be given for every violation to include fishing in closed waters \$500.00 fine, unattended set net \$25.00 fine, improperly marked gear \$50.00 and any other violations that apply. In cases involving crab or shrimp pots citations may be issued for not having rot cord and not being marked with Tulalip Tribes Crab Pot tags

Listed below are the confiscated items:

- Approximately 175 commercial crab pots in

various conditions ranging from derelict gear in poor condition to gear in fair condition.

- Approximately 12 shrimp pots in various conditions.
- Approximately 35 nets ranging from approximately 10ft to 600ft with various types of Corklines, Leadlines, Webing, etc. The condition of these nets range from poor condition to fair condition.
- several fishing poles

If you believe some of this gear is yours contact one of the Fish and Wildlife staff at the Tulalip Marina.

Upon Forfeiture of any Confiscated gear by the Tulalip Tribal Court, the Tulalip Fisheries Executive Director will set an Auction date for all Forfeited items.

Attention Tribal Hunters

Please turn in your hunting tags at the Tulalip Administration building by **February 29th, 2016**. People that have not returned their tags by the above deadline may not receive tags for the upcoming 2016-2017 hunting season & will not be able to enter in the 418 special elk drawing.

If you cannot make it during this time please call Amanda Shelton and will make a date that is convenient for you. You may also mail them in using the address given below or come into the Tulalip Administration Building and drop them off in the hunting tag drop box by the first CSR desk.

Willy's 34 points lead Hawks to blowout victory, 76-55

The Tulalip Heritage Hawks basketball team finished the regular season with a 12-8 overall record, 11-4 within the league. That was good enough for the Hawks to qualify as a #2 seed in the 2016 District 1B boys basketball tournament. Their opening round opponent was the Shoreline Christian Chargers. The game was played on Friday, February 5, at Shoreline High School.

In the 1st quarter, both teams went bucket-for-bucket almost the entire quarter before the Hawks closed out on a small run that gave them a 21-17 lead.

The 2nd quarter saw seniors Willy Enick and Robert Miles play a very effect two-man game, leading to high percentage shots for the Hawks. The Hawks played a near flawless 1st half, only committing four turnovers, and took advantage of their quality shots to take a 40-30 halftime lead.

At halftime the Hawks coaching staff commended the boys on their overall effort and commitment to playing smart basketball. The only bit of constructive criticism was the team wasn't boxing out and that if they focused on that the Hawks would take the game easily.

Starting the 3rd quarter, the Hawks focused in on their team rebounding and boxing out. It made a huge difference as they were able to limit the amount of Charger possessions and push the tempo, the way the Hawks like it. Willy continued his impressive shooting, as he caught fire to the tune of making five shots in a row before finally missing on a long 3-point attempt. In the end, Willy led all scorers with 34 points and a season high 10 assists, while Robert had 17 points and 12 rebounds to secure a first round victory, 76-55.

Robert's 35 points not enough in 57-67 loss

The Hawks (13-8) traveled to Lummi High School on Saturday, February 6, to take on the Mt. Vernon Christian Hurricanes (10-11) in a second round game of the District 1B boys basketball tournament.

Unfortunately, it only took three minutes of game time to see the Hawks were in deep trouble. With 4:50 remaining in the 1st quarter, seniors Willy Enick and Robert Miles collided at mid-court. Both players were attempting to pick off a long outlet pass and had their eyes on the ball, which led them running full speed into each other. Both players fell to the floor and the unintentional collision led to Willy suffering a laceration to his lip. Unable

to get the bleeding under control, Willy was helped off the court, taken to get stitches, and unable to return to the game.

Without Willy, the bulk of the Hawks offense and playmaking went onto Rob's shoulders. It took a while for Rob to find his offense, as he started the game shooting 1-7 from the field. In the final two minutes of the 1st half he was able to score a quick 9 points, giving him 13 at halftime with his team trailing 24-31.

In the 2nd half, the Hawks gave a good fight, but their lack of interior size and rebounding gave the Hurricanes many offensive rebounds and extra possessions. Rob continued to do what

he could on offense, even putting on a one man show by scoring 22 points in the 2nd half. Josh Iukes chipped in 7 points down the stretch, but it wasn't enough to overcome all the point blank shots and layups the Hurricanes continued to get.

When the game ended, Rob led all scorers with a season best 35 points, but the Hawks would take the loss 57-67. The Hawks have a few games off before their play-in game to the Tri-District Tournament and the hope is Willy will be able to play in that game. The Hawks need all the playmaking they can get in order to advance and keep their season alive.

struggled to get the ball up court at times. To adjust, coach Fryberg had Adiya run point and bring the ball up herself. That worked as she was able to dribble through the Hurricanes defense and initiated the offense. Adiya scored 9 points in the half and assisted on both baskets scored by Cyena and Desirae.

On defense, the Lady Hawks seemed to be a step behind the Hurricanes and were called on a lot of passes for blocking or contact. This put Aliya, Cyena, and Adiya all in foul trouble in the early going, which further hindered their routinely potent offense. At half time the Lady Hawks were in the unfamiliar position of trailing 13-18.

Coming out of half time, the Lady Hawks regrouped and found their groove. They sped up the tempo and played like we are accustomed to seeing on both sides of the ball. They won the 3rd quarter 17-4 and take a 30-22 lead into the final quarter.

Midway through the 4th quarter the Lady Hawks led 37-30 and looked like they would run away with the victory, but the Hurricanes had other ideas. The pressure defense put on by the Hurricanes, like in the 1st half, made it very difficult for the Lady Hawks to run their typical offense and forced a couple critical turnovers. Then with 1:51 left in the game, the Hurricanes hit a 3-pointer to cap off an 8-0 run and take a 38-37 lead. All the pressure was on the Lady Hawks.

With 1:10 to go, coach Fryberg called a timeout and drew up a play. Whatever it was worked, as Adiya took all the attention from three Hurricanes players, the ball ended up in the hands of Aliya with an open lane and she scored a running left hander. The Lady Hawks now led 39-38 with under a minute to go. The defense did the rest, as the Hurricanes were unable to get a quality shot off and the Lady Hawks secured their win to claim the District 1B title. With the victory the Lady Hawks now enter the Tri-District tournament as a #1 seed.

Lady Hawks edge Mt. Vernon Christian for District 1B title

The Tulalip Heritage Lady Hawks (19-0) finished the regular undefeated and earned the top seed in the District 1B girls basketball tournament. They traveled to Mt. Vernon Christian to take on the local Hurricanes (13-8) on Friday, February 5.

For the Lady Hawks, this would be their first game against stiffer competition. During the regular season the Lady Hawks completely destroyed team after team within their league. In fact, they averaged 61 points on offense while holding their opponents to only 29 points, giving the Lady Hawks an average margin of victory a whopping 32 points. That's a very impressive margin for any team, but now that the District and Tri-District tournaments are here, they bring much better teams and a level of competition we haven't seen all season.

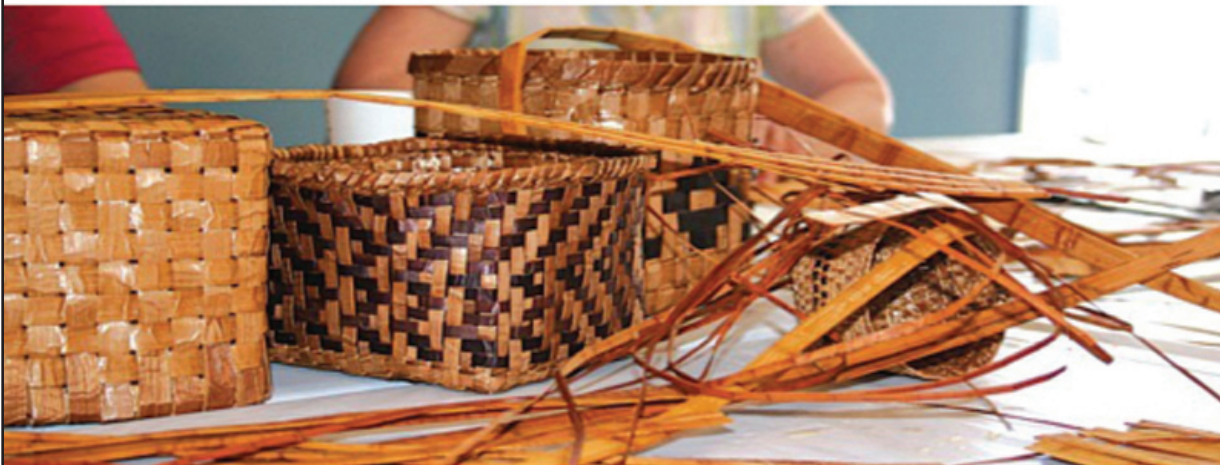

CERT is offered again

Disasters can strike at any time and being prepared for these and other unexpected events is critical to saving lives. Each one of us has a responsibility to understand the risk natural and man-made disasters pose to our communities, and to recognize we each have a role in preparing for these events. We have a duty to build a Culture of Preparedness in which our neighbors, families and friends are ready for any disaster event, and to make our communities safer, stronger, and better prepared.

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) concept was developed and implemented by the City of Los Angeles Fire Department in 1985. They recognized that people will likely be on their own during the early stages of an emergency or disaster. Accordingly, the fire department decided that some basic training in disaster survival and rescue skills would improve the ability of people to survive until responders or other assistance could arrive. For 30 years CERT trainings have taken place across



the U.S., even here on the Tulalip Reservation several years ago. Our pilot program in 2015 successfully graduated 9 participants and finished on November 19th, during a storm-caused power outage! Recognizing the value of this program the Tulalip Tribes Office of Emergency Management and Volunteer Preparedness Team is again offering CERT classes to our community.

CERT Basic Training is a free, instructor-led course consisting of over 20 hours of instruction on topics such as Personal and Family Preparedness, Earthquake Preparation, Team Organization, Medical Operations and Triage, Damage Assessment, Fire Suppression, Utility Control and Light Search & Rescue that can provide you with the skills you will need to stay safe and resilient during a disaster or emergency.

Our next CERT training will be held at the Administration building in the mornings from eight to noon for five sessions over 2 weeks. Each class will last 4 hours. The dates are Tuesday & Thursday March 15 and 17, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday March 22, 24 & 25. Because this is during usual work hours, supervisor permission is required and participants will be expected to attend all 5 sessions, establish a three (3) day home survival kit, obtain personal safety equipment, and be a willing team participant. CERT is about people helping people.

If you are interested in taking this course, ask your supervisor if you can get this time off and request an application/release form at Tulalip CERT (tulalipcert@tulaliptribes-nsn.gov).

Health insurance tax info

If you were enrolled in a Qualified Health Plan, you will receive the 1095-A form. You will need to include this information in your Federal Income Tax Return by completing the IRS Form 8962: Premium Tax Credit. You will receive a copy of your 1095-A in the mail. You can also access it by logging into your Washington Healthplanfinder account.

Health insurance premium tax credits (or premium tax credits) can be used to lower the health insurance premium costs of Washington Healthplanfinder Qualified Health Plans. If you qualified when you applied through Washington Healthplanfinder, you could either reduce the amount of your monthly health insurance premium (advanced premium tax credits), or get all of the tax credit as a lump sum when you file your annual tax return.

Advanced premium tax credits are paid by the IRS directly to the health insurance company that provides your health coverage.

If you or another member of your household received any advanced payments of premium tax credits, you must file a federal income tax return. It is possible that you may receive multiple forms depending on your coverage for the year.

If you or members of your household had coverage in 2015 through other programs or plans other than a Washington Healthplanfinder Qualified Health Plan, you may also get a Form 1095-B (Health Coverage) or Form 1095-C (Employer-Provided Health Insurance Offer and Coverage).

For questions regarding the 1095-B or 1095-C, please contact the agency or health insurer listed on the form.

Everyone who received Washington Apple Health (Medicaid) for one more month of 2015 will receive an IRS tax form 1095-B. The individuals listed on the 1095-B had minimum essential coverage (MEC) last year through Apple Health for the months listed on the form. This is for your information. The IRS already has a copy, so you do not need to submit this form with your tax return.

I attended the meeting where the three sites for a proposed tribal community building could be built in the near future. The Board of Directors wanted input from the community. There were only a few tribal members present, including some elders.

Three sites were proposed, one adjacent to the Tribal Administration Building, one where the Tribal Auto maintenance building is (across the street from the Gym), and the last was the Old Boom City site adjacent to the Karen Fryberg Health Clinic. My choice was the Old Boom City site since it was adjacent to Tulalip Bay with a view of the water as this is the last open space available adjacent to the bay. Tulalip has always been a fishing Tribe and in the olden times our elders lived on the beaches during fishing season.

After discussing all sites those present agreed on the Old Boom City site and the elders present thought this was great. Then when I received the Sey-yat-sub article

about the meeting staff were requesting further comments and asking for more input.

I attended the Elder/Senior meeting with the Board of Directors on 2/1 (the only Board members present were Marie Zackuse, Chair of the Services Committee and Les Parks)

I was going to bring my concerns about the Community Center but when I talked with Les Parks prior to the meeting he stated that he also thought the Boom City site was the designated site and it would be brought up by Resolution to the Board for their Sat. 2/6 meeting. I also told him that since this is as Community building I felt it should not be named after any tribal member as the building would be for ALL tribal members. Not one individual tribal member has contributed enough to receive this honor. I also said I believe it should have an Indian Name. Les totally agreed with me and said he was going through old files and came across a Commissioner of Indian Affairs report for the year 1871, where the Commissioner came from Washington D. C. to visit and bring back to the President what was happening on the reservations in Puget Sound.

Les said that for Tulalip the representative was a man named Napoleon, who the Commissioner referred to in his report as Chief Napoleon. This gentlemen spoke about what was happening on the Tulalip Reservation and stated he was a signer to the original Treaty and said most of those that signed had since deceased. I want to thank Les for giving me a copy of this report as it was very well written and provided information on what the reservations were like in 1871. Les suggested that the proposed Community Center be named after this man. After reading the report I called Les and told him I agreed that this would be an excellent name for our Community Center. Les said he would look for the Indian name for this man.

These are just my thoughts as I stated I believe our buildings should be named after our ancestors as they are the ones that started the Tribe on absolutely no money and due to their diligence and hard work saved our lands so we could have what we have today.
