



The Tulalip Heritage High School basketball program had a very successful year. Highlighted by the Lady Hawks going undefeated during the regular season and finishing the season as one of only eight teams in all of Washington to play in the State Championship tournament. Meanwhile for the Hawks, who lost four senior starters from last season, defied expectations as they rode the talents of Robert Miles and Willy Enick all the way to the Tri-District Tournament.

On Wednesday, March 30, the players came together with their coaches, family and community members to celebrate their season at the annual awards banquet held in the common area at Heritage.

Prior to the players receiving their awards, three instrumental elders were recognized and remembered for all their efforts that paved the path for today and tomorrow. The families of Dale Jones, Don "Penoke" Hatch Jr., and Francy J. Sheldon received blankets as a token of appreciation.

"It's a great idea to recognize and honor the folks who made it possible for Tulalip to have a high school and basketball program. They were very influential. Without their support and fight at that time you wouldn't be sitting here today, you wouldn't have been playing basketball in a Hawks or Lady Hawks jersey," said coach Marlin Fryberg to his players sitting amongst their families. "They shared a vision of community and pride that comes from having our own school and sports programs. It's very important that we remember these folks and what they did for us and future generations."

Chairman Mel Sheldon added, "Francy, Penoke and Dale...if you say one name you say the other two all in the same breath because of their shared vision for what they wanted to do for our community. Here we are tonight, enjoying the fruits of their labors. This is an opportunity that we call our own; our own school, our own teams, and our own memories.

"Athletics runs deep in our community and who we are. I've seen it over and over again when our community comes together to watch our kids play. To both the boys and girls teams, you created a lot of memories and experiences for us this year. We hope that you remember these high school experiences and carry them with you in a good way."

Each player on both teams received a letter of participation award for playing a full season at the Varsity level, and each player received a signature award for what their unique talents brought to their team.

Additionally, Coach Bubba and several of the Heritage players received league, district, and state-level recognition for their efforts on the hardwood. Those recognitions are listed below.

- Cyrus "Bubba" Fryberg, named Coach of the Year from the district.
- Robert Miles, named to the All-League
 1st team
- Michelle Iukes, recognized as the only 4-year player in Lady Hawks history.
- Keryn Parks, named to the All-League 2nd team.
- Aliya Jones, named to the All-League 2nd team.
- Adiya Jones, named to the All-League 1st team, voted MVP of Northwest 1B league, and listed on the 2016 All-State Honorable Mention team by The Associated Press.



North Intertribal Vocational Rehabilitation Program

The North Intertribal Vocational rehabilitation Program (NIVRP) assists Native Americans whose disabilities result in barriers to find employment, succeed at work and live independently in their Tribal communities. NIVRP serves the Nooksack, Sauk-Suiattle, Stillaguamish, Swinomish, Tulalip and Upper Skagit Tribes in Skagit, Snohomish and Whatcom counties and is based in Bellingham WA. The program makes available vocational rehabilitation services including culturally appropriate services for Native Americans with permanent disabilities.

Our representative at Tulalip is Sandy Gotts. Sandy has worked at Tulalip for nearly 20 years and "feels proud of being able to serve people of the Tulalip community". Professionally, Sandy would like to "see more programs involved in Wrap-around Services". Wrap-around programs are the programs who serve the Tulalip social services arena: TANF, Adult Services, Social Services and TERO. She would like to see information shared on a regular basis.



Sandy can help clients evaluate their disability and assist with helping them to choose an employment goal that best suits their abilities and interests. As soon as the employment goal is determined, Sandy helps identify the barriers to successful employ-



ment. She then assists in determining the steps needed to reach the clients employment goals. She also helps to coordinate the services needed to obtain successful employment.


NIVRP services can include the following: disability evaluations and assessments, vocational exploration, goal setting, vocational training, academic education, medical referrals, job search assistance, transportation assistance, coordination of programs, assistive devices, mental health counseling, advocacy and transitions from high school

Eligibility Criteria: Enrolled member of a Federally recognized tribe and 16 years of age or older; living in the NIVRP service area (Skagit, Snohomish or Whatcom Counties) and have a physical or mental impairment that is keeping you from looking for, getting, or keeping a job.

You can either be referred by an agency or you can refer yourself and call Sandy at 360-716-4723 and ask for the services yourself. If she is not in, just leave your name and phone number and Sandy will call you back to set up an appointment.

NIVRP will gather information about you that is necessary to determine your eligibility for vocational services. This information will be kept confidential (in accordance with 34 CFR 361.49).

Thank you for anyone who believes in me

Hello my name is Avel Medina Jr. I'm a Tulalip tribal members who feels that me and my sister, mother and her now ex-husband have been wrongly excluded by our tribe. What I'm about to say is something that has come to my attention about 3 years ago from my recently deceased grandmother Betty J Taylor.

Back in the 80s my grandmother used to work at the teriyaki store. While working there she was robbed at gunpoint by a guy named Robert Lawrence. The outcome of that was a lifetime restraining order. So fast forward to 1998, I was living with my grandma Betty and George Taylor and the cops sent Robert, who there's a lifetime restraining order against, to my grandmother's property to do a total of 12 controlled buys on us.

So since I heard of this from

my grandmother who was crying when I asked her about it and that I recorded but cannot for the life of me find the video to find someone or anything to see if it was all done illegally to exclude us from the rez! I was only 19 at the time and I'm 37 now and have always wanted to know what my life wouldve been like if I wouldve been able to help from the tribe, instead of cast out and made to feel an outcast or no good.

So how I dealt with it all was by turning to the drug life even deeper and deeper to numb myself. The one place I've ever known was to be no more. I always came back though. I always used to have to hide in cars with tinted windows or have a car in front of me and behind me even just to go to a family event such as Christmas or Thanksgiving. That exclusion and drugs eventually ran my life since 1999 till 1-28-2106.

I had around thirteen tresspasses because I was homeless off the rez, all my family is on the rez. I was a homeless drug addict who couldn't go home who how was getting hardened to the life of jails and institutions. For my last tresspass the courts sent me to the Federal penitentiary where the judge about laughed because I went there for 2 grams worth meth and a tresspass charge.

So fast forward to 2012, I still haven't had enough so I get in deeper and do a 30 month sentence in prison. I've got 3 boys now and a grandaughter, a woman who sees in me my struggle and my strength. My struggle is my addiction. My strength is my endurance to never give up on my life and the want to overcome my struggle which I'm doing now.

Once I was in work release before I got out, my grandmother was sick dying in the hospital. She waited for me, I know she did. I was able to go and see her and I told her that I would make her proud of me. Finally after I left the hospital 3 hours later she passed away. She was my real mother. So I got oout of prison March

25, 2015 and was doing good for awhile. I even my exclusion lifted, but my grandmother not being there eventually got to me and I relasped, caught a posession charge and here I am now writing this letter to you, my tribe, from a jail cell. I'm writing this to let you all know that the struggle is real out there and I placed so high of expectations of myself and feel I let everyone down. But I did not fail. I will not fail, I can't fail. I feel that if I say that I'm gonna do right, then I show it and not talk about it, which I was doing. But I also want to admit and take responsibility when I'm wrong. I will fullfill that promise to my grandmother.

Thank you for anyone who believes in me and if you don't, I can't to make you a believer in me because I know I won't be able to do any of it if I'm not clean and sober.


